#### 2017 NBFTA AGM

# **Lyme Disease**

Lyme disease is here in New Brunswick.
Know about it, prepare for it and protect against it!

#### What can you do?

If your employees work outside they need to be informed about Lyme Disease and the importance of preventing and reporting tick bites. While Lyme Disease can be effectively treated with antibiotics in the early stages, if left untreated it can become a serious and debilitating disease with symptoms lasting years. To monitor this **potential occupational disease**, the NB Forest Safety Association recommends companies adopt a procedure for tick screening, documenting and reporting tick bites. Employees should be instructed on how to properly store and record any ticks removed so that the tick will be available for testing in the event that the individual develops symptoms of Lyme Disease.

#### How to protect against Lyme Disease?

Wear long sleeved shirt

Tuck pant legs into boots or duct tape boot legs

Wear light clothing so ticks will be more visible

Use insect repellent containing DEET

Screen yourself daily upon returning from the woods

La maladie de Lyme est ici dans Nouveau Brunswick. Soyez informer, préparezvous et protégez vous contre cela!

#### Que pouvez-vous faire?

Si vos employés travaillent à l'extérieur, ils doivent être informés sur la maladie de Lyme et sur l'importance de prévenir et de rapporter les pigûres de tiques. Même si la maladie de Lyme peut être traitée de façon efficace avec des antibiotiques au tout début, sachez que si elle n'est pas traitée, la maladie peut devenir sérieuse et être composée de symptômes qui peuvent se manifester pendant des années. Pour surveiller cette maladie potentiellement professionnelle, l'Association de sécurité de forêt du NB recommande que les compagnies adoptent une procédure pour le dépistage des tiques, la documentation ainsi que le rapport des piqûres de tiques. Les employés devraient être informés sur la façon appropriée de documenter et de garder les tiques retirées de la personne pour que celles-ci soient disponibles à tester dans l'éventualité que la personne développe des symptômes reliés à la maladie de Lyme.

#### Comment protéger contre la Maladie de Lyme?

- Protez des chandails à manches longues ajusté aux
- Portez des pantalons longs tout en enfilant leurs extrémités dans vos chaussettes ou vos bottes,
- Portez des vêtements de couleur pâle; il sera plus facile de détecter les tiques.
- Appliquez des insectifuges contenant du DEET
- Vérifiez attentivement si des tiques se sont agrippées à vous après avoir travaillé dans le bois

### NBFTA TECHNICIAN OF THE YEAR AWARD

The New Brunswick Forest Technicians Association (NBFTA) will annually recognize a member of the Association for outstanding achievement. The award will recognize the achievements or contributions of a forest technician / technologist to forestry. The award shall be awarded only once to an individual.

#### **Selection Committee**

A committee of three, including a member of the Executive who will act as chair of this committee, a former recipient of the award, and a non-member of the association shall have the responsibility of collecting nominations and determining the winner of this award. They shall also have the responsibility of making sure that the winner is present at the AGM to receive the award.

#### Nominations

Any member of the NBFTA may be nominated for this award. A member of the Association or a member of the public may make a nomination for this award, nominations shall be sent to the chair of the publicity committee by December 31, prior to the AGM of the association. In order for a nomination to be accepted it must be signed by two members of the NBFTA. A resume of the individual being nominated must accompany the nomination.

#### **Promotion**

A picture of the winner shall be published in the Azimuth. A suitable permanent location has been established at the Maritime College of Forest Technology to display award winners.

#### **Evaluation Criteria**

A nominee for the Technician of the Year Award shall exhibit the following:

- o Is a member in good standing of the NBFTA
- Demonstrate adherence to the code of ethics of the NBFTA
- o Demonstrate initiative in progressing forest technical/technological field
- o Be recognized by her/his peers as a leader in forestry
- Demonstrate a commitment to continuing education
- Demonstrate a commitment to the NBFTA


#### Recognition


## **Acadian Timber Student Planters**


